# That's right!

# But it changes the sound of vowels

- \*specifically, the vowels that the silent "e" follows
- \*from their short sounds to their long sounds.

## Vowels (a, e, i, o, u) have 2 sounds

A short sound (the normal one)



# Vowels (a, e, i, o, u) have 2 sounds

And a long sound (the sound of the name of each letter).



#### What does a silent E do, again?

• It changes the **short** sound of vowels to **long** sounds of vowels.

## When do you use the silent E?

For "long" vowels at the end of words, usually

# Tap out the sounds (not the syllables)

consonant sounds and vowel sounds

"tap"

<u>t a p</u>





"cap"

<u>c</u> <u>a</u> <u>p</u>





"Phone" fone

"Bone"

b o n

"Fate"

fate

"Hate"

hat e

"Mate"

m a t

"Rate"

rate

"Bite"

b i t e

"Fine"

fine

B

bomb, comb, climb, crumb, dumb, debt, doubt



#### Other silent letters

T

match, watch, catch, scratch, often, soften, listen, fasten,

hour, honest, archive, chaos, character, chemical, echo, vehicle,
